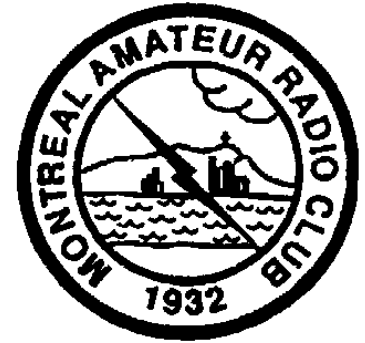

**LACHINE CANAL BOAT PARADE
GRANDE PARADE DU CANAL**

On May 25, 2002 there will be a marine parade to celebrate the re-opening of the Lachine Canal to pleasure craft. Organizers are expecting as many as 150 vessels of all types and as many as 50,000 spectators. Amateur Radio has a role to play at this event to keep it running smoothly. The

parade itself is expected to start at 11:00 AM from the Atwater Basin and proceed west to Lachine arriving at about 4:00 PM. There will be a radio network in operation for the safety boats involved as well as one for the safety (first aid) personnel. These will be on marine and commercial frequencies. A third network will be required to ensure that all of the volunteer crews have the information which they need. This third network will be manned by amateur radio operators using either VE2RED or an appropriate simplex frequency.

While a few operators will be on boats or in a golf cart most will be on foot. It is important that everyone knows what is going on and that will be our role. This is an excellent opportunity to show off the capabilities of amateur radio to both the the event organizers, Parks Canada and the general public.

RAC BULLETINS

TOPHAT 2002

Congratulations to the North Shore Amateur Radio Club for taking 1st place at the annual TOPHAT amateur radio competition. Second place went to New Westminster and 3rd place to the Burnaby team. 9 teams, 39 locations and 150 amateurs competed in TOPHAT 2002 on April 6th. TOPHAT is an amateur radio emergency communications competition testing the procedures, training, and capabilities of amateurs under emergency conditions.

The exercise was run on a Saturday morning from 8:30 to 12:00 noon and required amateurs to set up stations at their municipal emergency operations centre, a reception centre for evacuees, the hospital, and one surprise location.

The exercise was based on the 1962 Tropical Storm Freida which resulted in seven fatalities in B.C., 50 in Washington and Oregon, and resulted in power outages up to three weeks in some areas. 20% of the trees in Stanley Park were knocked down and bridges and airports were closed as winds lifted vehicles and flipped planes.

Surprise locations included Nexen Chemical on the North Shore, BC Hydro Emergency Operations Centre, St. John Ambulance, the Salvation Army, Vancouver Police Department, New Westminster Police Department, Pitt Meadows Airport, and the Provincial Emergency Program Regional Emergency Operations Centre.

TOPHAT is designed to improve the communications skills of amateurs and introduce organizations such as hospitals and emergency services to the capabilities of amateur radio. Teams were tested on set-up procedures, formal and informal message handling, HF and packet capabilities, and problem solving.

Teams from Burnaby, Coquitlam, Maple Ridge, New Westminster, North Shore, Richmond, Surrey, the Sunshine Coast, and Vancouver entered.

**ARISS INTERNATIONAL TEAM MEETS AT
MONTREAL**

On April 4th to 7th, the ARISS international team, with delegates from The USA, Russia, Japan, Canada and Europe, met at the Canadian Space Agency (CSA) headquarters in St Hubert, just east of Montreal. The meetings were moderated by Roy Neal W6DUE, and chaired by Frank Bauer KA3HDO.

Most of the meetings were devoted to discussions of current and possible new hardware for the amateur station on the ISS. Proposals were received from Russian, American and European members of the team, as well as from Bob Bruninga WB4APR of the US Naval Academy. These proposals will now be reviewed in detail by the ARISS Project Selection and Use Committee, which will prepare recommendations for approval by the ARISS delegates representing the ISS partner countries.

Marilyn Steinberg of the CSA participated in presentations about ARISS school contacts and educational outreach activities, and areas of possible co-operation between ARISS and the CSA were discussed.

Between meetings, Mark Steiner K3MS and Ken Pulfer VE3PU were able to schedule a short visit with Canadian Space Agency President, Marc Garneau. Both had worked with Garneau in the past when he was an active astronaut. During the discussions it was agreed that ARISS and CSA would work together to prepare an umbrella agreement covering co-operation in areas of mutual interest.

The week of March 18th. 2002, and continuing to March 20th. Amateur radio operators from the Montreal Amateur Radio Club and children at various schools, and Shriner's hospitals throughout North America have participated in the "Special event Station" for the "Children in Healthcare week 2002 Conference". This was held at the Montreal Shriners Hospital for Children.

Organized by John Grow VE2EQL, who is a long time Shriners Hospital volunteer and member of the Montreal Amateur Radio Club. John discussed the possibility of a special event station with the staff at the hospital. The go ahead was given on the spot, with only a week and a half to go before the conference. With the

assistance. Kenwood Communications Canada, provided the latest High Frequency Transceiver the TS-2000, which covers all of HF through to 70 cm, all mode. Please see the Kenwood Web for details on this fantastic radio.

We were lucky to have Dave Melanson, VE2MPD for the whole three days of operation, and Mac MacDougall, VA2YQ who was able to spend Tuesday at the station. Various HF nets were checked into, and many contacts were made on HF and 2 meters VHF. The conference had two high profile persons, who visited the station. Judge Andree Ruffo, and Dr. Bernard Shapiro, principle of McGill University. In addition to all the patients and their parents who were visiting the clinic, most of the hospital staff had a chance to see and ask questions. We had literature from MARC, RAQI, RAC and the ARRL on Ham radio.

Special Event Station, consisted of the following. Kenwood TS-2000 transceiver, covering 160 to 70 cm, all mode. The radio has a built in Automatic Antenna Tuner. The antennas were a 44" centre feed dipole, with ladder line to a LDG 4:1 balun. A 5/8 wave 2 meter antenna was used for 2 meters. We

FIELD DAY STRATEGIES FOR IMPROVING

YOUR RATING = FUN

It's getting nearing to that day, where we will cover a location with antennas, radios, personnel and food to help us survive for 2 days of field day operations. On each field day, you have many different groups with different specialities, we have the mega sites with numerous operators, QRP operations, all YL teams, kid operators, military equipment operators, and the list goes on. What ever group you will be with, or even if you're operating solo, there are many things that you could do to increase your point ratings per contact. Here is a list of a few simple things can make a difference.

Public Relations: Try to operate where there are people, yes its hard to put up a large antenna site, deal with security, have enough volunteers, provide information to the public, and operate field day at the same time. Depending on the size of your group and how many volunteers you can muster, this will earn you some extra points, but most importantly score points and hopefully educate the public. Who knows who will join our ranks. Even if you don't operate from a public site, send out press releases to local newspapers, media outlets, and your local TV station. Try to write a little piece about Amateur Radio and Field Day and where the public can visit your operation if possible. Local papers are always looking for material about events in the community. Remember, to try and get your press information, with enough time to get it published before your event.

Power: Operating off the local power company supply will earn extra points per contact. It doesn't matter if you are using batteries / solar power / generator or human power, depending on the logistics and operating location. The safest power source is sealed batteries, depending on the radios connected and their power output. This will mean that you have to operate at power levels lower than 100 watts, going to levels of 50, 25 or lower. Using 100 watts of power requires up to 22 amps of current. At 50 watts, up to 11 amps, and for 25 watts up to 5 or 6 amps. Depending on how much is transmit versus

receive time, will greatly affect the usable life of the battery before it needs to be recharged. It's best to try out your system on batteries before field day. The type of batteries used will make a great difference on operating time. The best type of batteries are stationary (deep discharge / cycle) sealed lead acid or Gel type. Any type of flood cell is dangerous, due to the hydrogen gas, and possible spillage of the acid. Automotive batteries were made for starting applications. There are many types of stationary batteries. (Please refer to the stationary battery list) Please keep in mind the logistics of operating with battery banks. You have to have a way to carry the batteries to and from the field day site, how you are going to charge the batteries and how you will hook up the batteries. Please keep in mind safety considerations in dealing with any type of battery. Please ensure that the batteries are fused properly.

Increasing the local contacts on HF: A great antenna developed for our Military forces to work stations within the skip zone from within 300 to 400 miles is a simple antenna for field day use. The NVIS (Near Vertical Incident Skywave) antenna will help you contact all those other stations that our signal normally overshoots. (Please refer to the Net Sources for NVIS details)

Preparedness: What ever you plan to do, planning is the most important and hardest part of preparing for field day. Below is a list of tips / action plans that you could follow, by no means is this a complete list that will suit all situations. You might have to modify, delete or add items that are more suitable for your field day group.

Special Notes to Clubs / Experienced Operators: Some people are far too serious about field day, Yes it gives us a chance, so we could fine tune our emergency skills, and nearly 24 hours of continuous operating time. But this is also a chance to give that new ham whatever age he or she is, a chance to operate on HF, be part of a team. Please, don't think of the new person in your club as someone just to help to set up equipment, antennas, towers, and all round gopher. Set schedules so to give everybody a chance,

and let the excitement take over, just as it did for us.

Planning List / Action Plan

- What type of field day event do you want to organize, multiple operator, CW only, QRP, all YL?
- What type of equipment will you need? IE: HF radios, antennas, power considerations, sleep area, food, Wash room services, shelter.
- How many operators, volunteers will you need? How dependable and committed are they to the plan.
- With your group, define what special areas need attention and give it to the person who has the technical expertise and experience. Make sure these key persons have help, ideally its best to pair up a person who does not have the experience. This is one of the best ways to learn.
- Prepare a list of all items that are non-radio, antennas, etc that you will need to operate. In other words the support items, staff, etc.
- No matter how big or small your field day plans are, make of list of possibilities of what could go wrong. After, make a list of your back-up plans.
- Make a list of all the tools that you will need? Better to have the tools on hand, than to waste time.
- Make a final plan, with all the times and the associated actions with defining tasks for each member of your group. By doing this, you will have an idea on how much time certain tasks will take, and how soon you will be operating.

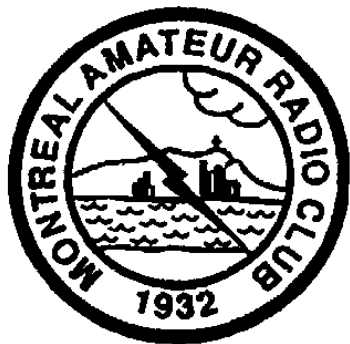
HUBERT (HERB) MORRISON
