HAM RADIO IN SPACE: GERMAN SPACE AGENCY REJECTS AMSAT DL MARS MISSION

Germany's space exploration plans will not support a proposed ham radio mission to the red planet. We have more in this report:

After five years of discussions and negotiations with the German space agency, AMSAT-DL reports that nation's space



exploration group has withdrawn its support for the amateur satellite organization's plan to send a ham radio satellite to Mars. This is the so-called P 5 or Phase 5 satellite mission.

According to the AMSAT News Service, the agency advised the group that P5's mission was not financially feasible. Also that compared with the current Mars missions the scientific attraction was simply not there. You can read that as being of insufficient interest to the formal scientific research community.

The decision by the German Space Agency also affects plans for a geostationary Earth-orbiting ham radio satellite. This being the so called Phase 3 E which was to be part of the overall P 5 program. None of this is good news for amateur radio's future exploration of the final frontier.

(For the Amateur Radio Newsline, I'm Burt Hicks, in Los Angeles. Note just mention that this was reported by Burt and that it comes from the show dated 9 November).

Add as footnote: AMSAT-DL officials sat that they are not giving up hope for these missions. They note that their organization recently had some interesting meetings in China adding that if it cannot do rocket science in Germany, that it will have to look for other countries. (ANS)

QRZ? Changing?

Some folks may have noticed that the behavior of the QRZ callsign search engine has changed. That's because we've just completed a major rewrite of the callsign search function and are pleased to announce several new features. These include:

Support for prefix and suffix lookups using the star (*) character, e.g. try "AA*"

The ability to find partial callsigns (e.g. *7x*)

Improved USA County search

The ability to list all of the QRZ callsigns for a given DXCC entity

The ability to search by both major and minor grid squares

To see the new features, which include help info, just click on the search button at the top of the page, without filling in the search box. You will be brought to a new search box having all the aforementioned options.

This software update has also introduced more performance improvements and a general rewrite of many key functions. The callsign pages are now lighter (having fewer bytes to transfer) and some features are now loaded on demand instead of by default. One feature, however, which we called Notes, did not make the cut over. We're reviewing the usefulness of this feature which at its core was a Twitter-like capability that didn't work as well as Twitter. We're going to reevaluate the feature to see if it continues to make sense. Our sense is that the majority of our users didn't make use of it.

2012 ARRL Boxboro Convention

This past August 24th. – 26th. The ARRL New England Division Convention was held in Boxborough, Massachusetts. This three-day event is organized by FEMARA Inc., which is a consortium of area radio clubs. The convention has been running for over 30 years. The convention is held every 2 years, and had just over 2000 paying guests. The hotel and 2 other hotels within 5 minutes were all sold out of rooms. Elecraft had the most impressive booth, with all their products on display and working. The KX3 was showcased. In speaking with Eric Swartz - WA6HHQ, Elecraft, president, he reported that he was very happy with the orders that people were placing at the show. The most innovative new radio was offered by Flex radio with their SDR transceivers. But with pricing starting at \$6,500.00 to \$9,000.00 dollars. Flex radio's most popular sellers are the Flex 1500 and the 3000 series of models. Most of the major ham radio retailers were present, which had tons of radios and accessories for sale. It was noted, and with speaking with the exhibitors that hams were buying and spending money.

Yes, there was a lot of new radios, but if you are still running a somewhat vintage station, Hagerty Radio Company has some interesting products.
